



Assessment Rubric

An assessment of each student's research project will be based on the following:

Required Elements	 Each project is required to include: Four to five details from the resources provided Four to five quotations from partisan testimony and other primary-source documents that illuminate the individual partisan Two or three images, if applicable (Any additional information is a bonus.)
Content	Students will develop a museum-like presentation illuminating the life of the partisan they have chosen to research.
	 Presentations should include information about: How the actions of this partisan inspired the group How these actions challenge the myth that Jews were sheep being led to the slaughter The partisan's motivation The partisan's tactics Outcomes of these tactics Challenges and dilemmas the partisan faced
Creativity and Storytelling	 An important element of this project is storytelling. How well are students able to communicate the story of the partisan they have researched? Presentations might include a graphic display, a written narrative (in the form of a poem, an overview, a list, etc.), a selection of visual elements, or a digital
	presentation that combines both text and images.
Oral Presentation	 Student presentations should include: A compelling description of the partisan, with particular focus on: Choices and dilemmas Context and circumstances Quotations from the partisan and primary sources
	 Discussion of discoveries from the group's research: What motivated your partisan? Was there one main source of motivation, or were there many? What were the tactics your partisan employed? What were your partisan's goals? What was the outcome of your partisan's involvement in the resistance group?
